- Regardless of individual course grades, students must maintain a minimum 3.65 cumulative GPA at the end of their first year (fall, spring, summer term) followed by a 3.500 at the end of the third semester.
- Some colleges require a minimum GPA for major courses. Courses indicated in this column are included in the major GPA for this program of study.
- Students who do not place into MATH 122 or MATH 141 and do not bring in additional advanced credit, may need to enroll in 18 hours each term of freshman year.
- Students in the International Business: Chinese Business major must complete a minimum of four 300-level or higher Chinese language courses as part of their required program components. The Chinese Language Placement test will determine at which level the student will begin. Foreign language courses can be part of the required directed coursework, which may consist of courses toward a minor, cognate, or other coursework. The language requirement for the Chinese Business is heavily dependent on incoming language level. If students enroll at USC with C7 on their Chinese placement test, they may not be required to participate in the summer language institutes.
- The [Carolina Core](#) provides the common core of knowledge, skill and academic experience for all Carolina undergraduate students.
- International Business: Chinese Business majors are required to study abroad in the 3<sup>rd</sup>, and 4<sup>th</sup> semesters, as well as the summer before the 3<sup>rd</sup> semester. A summer program following the 4<sup>th</sup> semester is optional. Course selection is subject to availability at partner school with advisor approval.
- The total number of elective hours required depends on the number of hours used to fill other degree requirements, including the minor or cognate, multiple business majors or the business analytics concentration. Options to meet this requirement may include: pre-professional coursework, an accelerated master's program (maximum of 4 courses if not counted elsewhere in the degree), lower-level language courses (100-200 level in addition to Carolina Core requirements), electives, or a second business major. Consultation with your academic advisor is required to determine appropriate use of the electives.
- International Business major course:
  - Functional Courses** (3 hours): ACCT 426, IBUS 501, 502, 503, 405 (or MGSC 405), 430, 432; MGMT 406; ECON 503, 504, 505
  - Thematic Courses** (3 hours): IBUS 422, 423, 424, 425, 426, 427, 428, 429, 431, 433, 434, 435, 519, 521
  - Regional Courses** (3 hours): one course with Asian focus **while abroad**.
  - One additional regional, functional, or thematic course (3 hours)**
- International Business majors are required to complete a second functional major in the business school. Total program hours and number of courses may vary, depending on the major chosen. Based on choice of major and entering language ability, students may exceed 15 hours some semesters and/or need summer coursework. However, many students bring in AP/IB credit to satisfy some course requirements.

### Program Notes:

- Courses identified as "critical" must be completed with a grade of "C" or better in the student's first year in the Darla Moore School of Business in order to continue in the Business School.
- Admission to the International Business Chinese Business major is highly competitive and enrollment is limited.
- Students may pursue a **Business Analytics Concentration** (9 hours) in conjunction with their functional major.
- Students may choose to complete a **Sustainability in Business Concentration** (12 hours) in conjunction with the International Business major. Courses applied in the major may not also fulfill concentration requirements.
  - Required: MKTG 472 – Business, Markets and Sustainability (3) and IBUS 427 – Global Stakeholder Management (3)
  - Choose 3-6 hours from the following: **ACCT** 550; **ECON** 500, 505, 548; **FINA** 473; **MGMT** 407, 408; **MGSC** 489
  - Choose 0-3 hours from the following: **ENVR** 321, 322, 331, 533; **GEOG** 321; **HTMT** 485; **POLI** 478
- Business courses may be repeated only once. Students may appeal to take a course for a third time and must see an advisor to complete the appeal process.
- Students must complete nine hours of international-focused courses. These courses can be satisfied within the 122 required hours and do not require additional coursework. At least three credits must be a Business or Economics course at the 300-level or above. The remaining six credits can come from: a) two Carolina Core courses OR b) two 200-level or above foreign language course(s) in the same language. - All undergraduate students must take a 3-credit course or its equivalent with a passing grade that covers the founding documents. This course may fulfill any requirement in the program of study. Courses that meet this requirement are listed in the academic [bulletin](#).
